COVID-19 News

New "Workplace Protection and Improvement Guide" launched

The minister for Business, Enterprise and Innovation has announced the launch of a new "Workplace Protection and Improvement Guide" published by the National Standards Authority of Ireland (NSAI) to help businesses navigate the ongoing COVID-19 crisis. The publication includes practical business guidance on physical distancing, home working, staggered work and what to do if an employee is symptomatic. The minister also announced €2,500 support for businesses to implement workplace preventative and recovery measures.

The Irish Congress of Trade Unions (ICTU) has said that employers must provide safe workplaces during the current pandemic. The ICTU General Secretary has stated that those who are allowed to go work during the coronavirus crisis must be protected.

Safe Pass, CSCS and QSCS course suspensions

The Department of Education and Skills has informed SOLAS that Safe Pass, CSCS and QSCS courses and assessments fall within the Government's public

health restrictions and therefore these courses have been suspended. All Safe Pass, CSCS and QSCS training and assessment ceased from 18.00hrs on 25 March until further notice. Legislation signed on 1 April 2020 provides that Safe Pass cards which expire on 1 March 2020 will be valid for the period of the Safe Pass training cessation.

Farmers urged to work methodically

Farmers are being asked to work methodically to ensure safety during the current COVID-19 lockdown. Teagasc made the appeal as farmers across the country continue to operate to keep the supply chain stocked. Farmers have been advised that, at this critical time, planning ahead is crucial to prevent farm injury. Teagasc has recently issued an updated version of its booklet “Farm Workshop Safety” to provide guidance on key safety measures when repairing or maintaining agricultural machinery - many farm accidents and injuries occur in farm workshops and during machinery maintenance.

Derogations from rules for hauliers

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) and the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport have agreed to allow a temporary and urgent derogation in respect of certain provisions of the EU driving and resting time rules. The move is being made because of the potential impact of the coronavirus on heavy goods vehicle operations and the importance of the road haulage sector to the national economy.

Construction ceases at National Children’s Hospital

The construction company for the new National Children’s Hospital has ceased work following new government guidelines this week. There was uncertainty over whether construction on the hospital counted as essential work and the company was waiting for clarification on this. The Minister for Health has said that most construction is not considered an essential service under new government guidelines, unless they are building something that is essential to this pandemic.

Calls made to suspend on-farm QA inspections

The Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine has been called on to temporarily suspend on-farm inspections in view of the urgency of minimising the risk of spreading COVID-19. It has been expressed to the department that the inspections would breach social distancing guidelines.

The Veterinary Council of Ireland (VCI) has issued updated guidance for vets around the country as COVID-19 continues to spread. The council highlighted that it is increasingly likely that over the coming weeks, due to self-isolation or social distancing measures, veterinary practices across the country will be stretched and safety measures need to be put in place.

A Limerick TD has said that the government should establish a confidential hotline for workers who are concerned their employers aren't adhering to physical distancing guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19. The TD has said that he has been contacted by workers of large employers who are concerned that physical distancing is not being followed in the workplace.

Business Link Up - Opportunity to donate goods or services

Since COVID-19 arrived, businesses have been contacting government bodies to offer to supply or donate goods and services. The government is creating a central database of these offers on behalf of the whole of the public service, including the HSE. Goods and services required by the health services are currently a priority but this may change as the situation develops. Businesses already supplying goods or services to the government need not to do anything as normal arrangements will apply.

Over 200 assaults on Dublin Bus drivers since 2018

According to details released under the Freedom of Information Act, 107 Dublin Bus drivers were attacked on duty in 2018. This number slightly reduced to 100 in 2019. A spokesperson for the National Bus and Rail Union described the level of assaults as a disgrace.

UK NEWS

£600k fine for yoghurt manufacturer

A UK-based yoghurt manufacturing company has been fined £600,000 after two employees suffered serious injuries following the release of an acidic cleaning solution. One of the employees suffered burns from the acid and the other employee sustained injuries from a fall while trying to escape the acidic cleaning fluid. The company pleaded guilty to breaching Section 2(1) of the Health and Safety at Work etc Act 1974.

Waste management company fined £140k following amputation

A waste management company has been fined £140,000 after an agency worker suffered a lower leg amputation after being struck by a moving excavator. The worker, who had been observing a tipping activity in the blind spot of the excavator, had his leg crushed by the machine which had reversed to accommodate another vehicle tipping off waste in an adjacent part of the site. The company pleaded guilty to a breach of Section 3(1) of the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974.

Good Practice Award for family run business

A family-run potato-sorting business in the Netherlands received an EU-OSHA Healthy Workplaces Good Practice Award for reducing workers' exposure to potentially harmful dust in the potato-sorting shed. The company collaborated with an occupational health service provider by combining technical, organisational and personal protective measures that have considerably reduced the amount of dust in the air.

Over 1,000 cyclists injured in 2018

More than 1,000 cyclists were injured in 2018 with most of those happening during the morning and evening rush hours. Eighty-seven per cent of injuries occurred on urban roads. The RSA has called for greater investment in cycling infrastructure and more speed limits in rural areas.

Numbers of deaths on Irish roads soar despite coronavirus restrictions

One person on average has died on Irish roads every 32 hours in the month of March despite the unprecedented COVID-19 restrictions on both normal life and work. The soaring rate of traffic fatalities has prompted the RSA and an Garda Síochána to plead for greater care to be taken on roads. It is believed the rate of fatalities may be linked to the higher number of people driving for leisure and exercising outdoors during the first wave of restrictions.

Road deaths up by 24% compared to 2019

The number of fatalities on Irish roads is up 24% so far in 2020 compared to this time last year. As of 26 March 2020 there has been 47 road deaths in Ireland, nine more than for the same period in 2019. The road death victims include 14 pedestrians, 20 drivers, eight passengers, four motorcyclists and one cyclist. The RSA, An Garda Síochána and the Irish Association for Emergency Medicine have expressed concern at the significant increase in the number of road deaths.

Ireland's DIYers causing problems for doctors during COVID-19 crisis

Ireland's top trauma doctors, concerned about the forthcoming COVID-19 surge, are pleading with the public to reconsider doing house improvement jobs as they're already seeing an upsurge in DIY accidents. Injuries range from busted fingers from hammers to open fractures from falling off roofs and ladders. Doctors seek to remind the public that as there will still be car crashes, strokes and heart attacks during the expected corona crisis, hurt DIYers and risk takers need to understand their actions will soon put pressure on crucial hospital staff.

Five-year-old boy killed on Co. Roscommon farm

A five-year-old boy has died following a fall from a trailer on a farm in Co. Roscommon. An Garda Síochána was called and the boy was pronounced dead at the scene. The HSA has been informed and will launch an investigation.

Man dies in Co. Cork farm fatality

A 64-year-old man has died after being attacked by a bull on his farm in Co. Cork. The man was attending to a number of bulls in a shed when the attack happened. Emergency services were called and he was pronounced dead at the scene. The HSA has been notified and will launch an investigation into the fatality.

Man dies in Co. Cavan farm accident

A man in his 50s has died in a farm accident in Co. Cavan. It is understood the incident involved a tractor. The Health and Safety Authority has been notified and has launched an investigation into the accident.

Man dies in Co. Laois workplace accident

A man in his 40s has died at a property where construction work was taking place in Co. Laois. The man was pronounced dead at the scene. The HSA has been notified of the death.

A man in his 30s has died after he was hit by a bin truck that he was working on in Dublin. The HSA and the local coroner have been notified. An Garda Síochána has appealed for any witnesses or camera or dashcam footage.

Man airlifted to hospital following workplace accident

A man who suffered serious injuries in a workplace in Mullingar was airlifted to hospital in Dublin. It is understood the man suffered crush injuries when stock fell on him. The HSA has launched an investigation into the circumstances of the accident.

Forestry worker suffers crush injuries in Cork

A tree surgeon was taken to hospital after suffering crush injuries following an incident in Co. Cork. The alarm was raised after the woman, who was engaged in tree felling and clearing work, became trapped under a tree. Her injuries have been described as serious but not life-threatening.

Two injured crewmen rescued from super-trawler off Clare coast

Two crew members who were seriously injured on board a Dutch super-trawler were airlifted to hospital by an Irish Coast Guard helicopter. Storm Force 8 winds delayed the Irish Coast Guard from dispatching a helicopter to meet the vessel. The trawler set course for the Irish coast to shorten the distance the helicopter would have to travel. A paramedic was lowered to the vessel and assessed the casualties who were then placed in stretchers and winched on board the helicopter. They were taken to the emergency department in University Hospital Limerick.

Man rescued after four storey fall down narrow shaft

Firefighters in Galway City rescued a construction worker under very difficult circumstances after the man fell four storeys down a narrow shaft on a construction site. The accident scene was attended by the fire service, an Garda Síochána and ambulance crews. The man was taken to hospital with

injuries which are understood to not be life-threatening.

IN THE COURTS

Construction firm fined €100k following asbestos exposure

A UK-registered construction company has been fined €100,000 following exposure of workers to asbestos during construction activity in Dublin city centre. The company had earlier pleaded guilty to a charge under the Safety, Health & Welfare at Work (Exposure to Asbestos Regulations) 2006 and 2010. The company pleaded guilty to a charge under Regulation 7(a) of the Asbestos Regulation in that they failed to carry out a risk assessment as to whether ceiling boards contained asbestos material prior to their removal.

Bus driver sacked after multiple complaints about defective cushions

A long-serving bus driver was sacked after he declared 10 buses defective over a two-day period because of “collapsed cushions” on his driver’s seat. All of the buses were subsequently examined by engineers and mechanics who could find nothing wrong. The driver sued for unfair dismissal at the Workplace Relations Commission where the adjudication concluded that the complaint was “not well founded”. The driver argued that he reported the defects in a bid to ensure his workstation was conducive to his personal needs, that he was acting for the good of all concerned in reporting the defects and that the sanction of dismissal was disproportionate. He was seeking reinstatement to his position. The driver was on a final written warning following a similar occurrence in December 2018.

Prison officers lose court challenges over bullying allegations

Three prison officers have lost their separate High Court challenges related to internal transfers and bullying allegations. The three complainants were all members of an intelligence gathering and gang-disrupting unit called the Operational Support Group (OSG). They claimed they were denied fair procedures and natural justice when decisions were made arising out of bullying allegations against two of the officers. The judge in the three cases refused to grant them declarations that their rights under the Constitution and under their employers’ dignity at work policy had been breached.

€60k injuries claim against GAA dismissed

A judge has ordered a Gaelic football fan to pay the GAA's legal costs after he took a case against the organisation claiming negligence. The case arose after the man fell while descending steps at a stadium following a match. The judge praised the level of care taken by the GAA to ensure the safety of fans stating that the stadium's management team went to remarkable lengths.

Woman settles claim against council following ankle injury

A woman, who will have to wear a special insole in one of her shoes for the rest of her life following a fall in a public park, has settled a €60k damages claim against a county council. The woman told her counsel that she twisted her ankle when she stepped into a hole hidden by grass which, at the time, came up to her knees. The woman twisted her ankle outwards in the fall and the pain persisted for six weeks. She was required to visit an orthopaedic surgeon and to receive steroid injections as part of the treatment.

A boy who cut his knee when he fell on a tree stump at a mid-term camp has settled his High Court action for €55,000. The boy was 10 at the time of the accident which occurred when he wandered off into an area of bushes while attending the mid-term break art camp. The boy has been left with a scar on his knee.

The family of a woman who died when her pony and trap smashed onto rocks at a well known beauty spot is to sue the county council for up to €700,000. The case will be brought to the High Court when normal service resumes after the COVID-19 crisis.

LEGISLATION UPDATE

Safety, Health and Welfare at Work (Construction) (Amendment) Regulations 2020 (S.I No. 102 of 2020)

The purpose of these Regulations is to amend the Safety, Health and Welfare at Work (Construction) Regulations 2013 (S.I. No. 291 of 2013) (as previously amended by Safety, Health and Welfare at Work (Construction) (Amendment) Regulations 2019 (S.I. No. 129 of 2019)) to extend the validity of safety awareness registration cards which cannot be renewed as a result of the COVID-19 emergency. This statutory instrument was signed on 31 March 2020 and came into operation with immediate effect.
